School Newspaper Renamed

Responding to pressure from headquarters to choose a more appropriate name for the school newspaper than *The Army Brat*, the staff held a contest to rename the paper. The name chosen, not a common newspaper name like *Post* or *Times* and not a name that alliterated like *Mustang Messenger*, was *Trichter*, a German word meaning "funnel."

The Nürnberg Trichter goes back to medieval times, and according to legend one could pour knowledge directly into someone's head with it.

The person who won the contest and gave the paper its new name is believed to be long-time teacher of French and German at the school, **Dr. Peter Kroner**, a Romanian native and graduate of Erlangen University – *Archivist*

What did you think of the proceeding? Humorous? . . . Disgusting? . . . No harm done? . . .


