Important Events of 1955-56

- Aug. 25 The last Soviet forces leave Austria.
- Nov. 5 Racial segregation is forbidden on trains and buses in interstate commerce.
- Dec. 1 Rosa Parks is arrested for refusing to give up her seat on the bus to a white person, and the national civil rights movement begins.
- Dec. 5 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and other Black ministers unite to coordinate a Black boycott of city buses in Montgomery, AL.
- Dec. 31 General Motors becomes the first U.S.corporation to make over \$1 billion in a year. [GM declares bankruptcy in June 2009]
- Feb. 22 Elvis Presley enters music charts for first time with "Heartbreak Hotel."
- Mar. 23 Pakistan proclaimed an Islamic republic.
- June 14 President Dwight D. Eisenhower authorizes the phrase "under God" to be added to the Pledge of Allegiance.
- June 29 President Dwight D. Eisenhower signs the Federal Aid Highway Act, creating the Interstate Highway System.




