



Togetherness is ... doing things with others





At future gatherings of students here at the Europahaus, more learning can be accomplished, and even better German-American relations can be established."

Political-economic involvement

In autumn, 1972, nineteen students from Mr. Emanuel Raab's U. S. Government classes attended a week-long political-economic seminar at the invitation of the Europahaus in Bad Marienberg, Germany. From November 6-10, they and a German class from Alsfeld participated in lectures and discussions on such topics as West European Unity and the Common Market, East European Unity, and Comparisons of U.S. and German Governmental Structure. One highlight of the week's activities was an afternoon field trip to Bonn to visit the German governmental chambers. All during the week, the Americans and Germans formed new friendships and overcame "national character" differences. As the week drew to a close and the American students departed the Europahaus for Nuernberg, both they and the Germans hoped to meet again in the spring at another seminar in France.


Berlin: a second journey

Restructured Student Council works to promote student involvement

"Are we representing the students as best as we can?" This was the thought foremost in the minds of the four student council officers as they got together in the summer of 1972 to revise their constitution. These newly elected officers thought about and decided that their organization would be more effective if the constitution allowed each class to elect five voting members, shifting the homeroom representatives to a nonvoting status. The officers proudly presented this constitution for approval at the beginning of the school year.

Registration of the students in mid-August was the next task, followed closely by the traditional "Get-Acquainted Dance" in September. The new Council members



decided to rename this dance the "No-Occasion Dance" as the time for getting acquainted had long passed.

By now the Council had a full complement of one figurehead, six officers, and twenty senators. With Homecoming getting closer weeks were filled with planning. The Junior-Senior Powder-Puff Football game, the presentation and coronation of the Royal Court, and the Homecoming Dance were topped with victories by the football teams and the cross country team.

Once again the Council was free to perform their real duty as a student government: representing the students.

Led by President Alan Maloney and Vice President Marlon Riggs, the Student Council tackled many existing problems: Who is authorized to sell refreshments during snack break? What can we do about the litter problem in the dorm smoking area? How can we stop student theft at Foodland? Why is the quality of food in the cafeteria so poor? Will there ever be a change in the school time schedule? The students now know that their questions and major complaints are being considered and dealt with. The future is optimistic.

Active is the word for the 1972-73 Junior High Student Council, guided by Mr. Larry Mathern along with In-Council advisor, Mr. Lucius Drake and funds advisor, Mr. Bill Yost. Using parliamentary procedure, a representative and an alternate were elected from each junior high social studies class. From this representative body were elected President George Terrell; Vice-President Chris Johnson; Secretary Cindy Garcia; Treasurer Denise Shelby; and Sergeant at Arms Eddie Spann. Planning activities for their peers (the purpose of the council) is done by the officers and the representatives or their alternates.

Among the events was a dance with a live band. To fund this event students, with the help of Mrs. Hattie Terrell (mother of President Terrell), sold refreshments at the dance. Bake sales provided snacks during the mid-morning class break and funded student activities. More funds were raised by selling chocolate bars stamped with the Nuernberg crest.

The National Honor Society is composed of students from grades ten through twelve whose eligibility for induction is based on grade-point averages and faculty recommendation. The object of the society is to creat an enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service to others, to promote leadership and to encourage the development of character in the students of Nuernberg American High School.

Induction into the honor society takes place with a formal ceremony once each year. (Inductees are not made aware of their acceptance into the society until they are "tapped" in the induction ceremony.) Speeches on the society's essential qualities of character, scholarship, leadership, and service are given by the society's officers, and a different colored candle is lighted during each speech. The inductees take an oath to uphold these qualities after they have been "tapped". Members receive a card and a scroll or pin. A reception for parents, faculty and members follows the ceremony.

Contributing to the support of Tara Wadraj, an Indian child who maintains regular correspondence with her friends, is one of the group's major projects. Members wash cars and sell baked goods to raise money for this endeavor.

An organization such as an honor society is essential to any high school, for it gives the impetus and incentive for high achievement in all areas of campus life.











What goes into those four highly tuned, finely condensed and fun to read pages of your school paper, purchased for only 15c? Nine times each year *Trichter* staffers strive to meet deadlines by completing their articles. Then the *Trichter* evolves from under reams of ink-stained paper to the columns of glossy print which meets your eye.

The paper's original title was *The Army Brat*, until 1947 when Headquarters suggested that it be named after something symbolic of Nuernberg. After some history rummaging, staffers discovered that Nuernberg was a noted cultural center of the 14th century, and was said to have had culture "funneled" through the city. NAHS adopted the idea and from it comes the *Trichter*, (the German word for funnel) which funnels staff articles as well as unsolicited material generated by student concern, to its readers.











Studying and relaxing together, sharing meals or rooms, knowing a counselor will always listen, dorm life offers a togetherness few will forget.





This years' cross-country team sustained with flying colors its ancient and hallowed traditions of eccentricity and anonymity. However, one tradition that was broken this year was that of losing.






Nuernberg's 1972-73 Varsity Basketball team was shorter and younger than any team in USDESEA. With these disadvantages the team was held to a 1-13 season.

Yet the season had its highlights with a number of outstanding individual performances. Bob Crosby, the team's only senior, holds the team's field goal accuracy record at 45%. Sam Buster led the team in scoring with 68 field goals (162 total points) with an average of 11.6 points per game. In second place is Joe Houston with 48 field goals. Scoring 26 points against Karlsruhe, Buster also holds the team's record for the highest number of points scored in one game. Scoring the second highest number of points in a single game, with 17, is Issac Sapp. Dieter Bednarski, scoring an average of 10.8 points per game, led the team at the foul line with an accuracy record of 77%.


Another team record is held by Joe Houston who led the team in rebounding with 94. Closely following Houston is Calvin Palmer with 92 rebounds for the season.




Dorm counselors hear 'em out


