ARCHIVIST'S NOTES

This PDF file of the Nürnberg American High School's first yearbook with pictures, "The Voyager," is primarily a reproduction of the copy owned by Barbara (Kale) Falzini, NHS class of 1948. It was scanned by her son Mark Falzini and sent to me, the Nürnberg Alumni Association archivist/historian, in response to a call for historical memorabilia from NHS alumni. It also incorporates material from the yearbooks of the late Don Hilty, '49, and Peggy (Segur) Misch, '48.

This file of NHS's first yearbook is unusual in several ways. First of all, very few of the pages in the yearbook were printed. Most, if not all, photographs were individually pasted into each person's copy. In some instances, a place where a picture was supposed to be pasted is empty. Joan Kay (McCarter) Adrian, '49, has offered some explanations for the missing photos. In the case of two seniors whose individual pictures are missing, Joan notes that they did not actually graduate with the class of 1948. Pictures are also missing in the "Who's Who" section. Joan thinks maybe these people were not present at the time of the photo shoot. These pictures are missing in all three copies of the yearbook that I have seen. If any alum has more information on the missing pictures, I would very much like to hear from you.

Secondly, this file is an enhanced version of the original yearbook. What I have done is to crop out each individual picture in the original file and then enlarge it and enhance it to the best of my ability with the Microsoft "Picture It" program.




