Time we know can be deceitful, A cheater of honest men, And when lost in daily scurry Can never be found again.


Time we've found will wait for no man, Time will rule its own, Time will be the final judge, Time and time alone.

We, the class of 1964, have come a long way since those first questionable days in high school.



The spark for this tremendous season was team Captain and leading point man, Curtis Tullie. Many thanks to Mr. Wendell Jahnke, the coach.



Coach Campbell's Eagles came back after the defeats at Frankfurt to crush the Heidelberg Lions 55—32.


Dave Worland and Lenny Habas both had a field day as they hit for 21 and 19, respectively.
