



**LEGAL STATUS OF US FORCES PERSONNEL
IN THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY**

1. Please read this card carefully and carry it always.
2. As a member of the United States Forces, civilian component or as a dependent in the Federal Republic of Germany, this card reminds you of your legal obligations and will assist you if you get involved in difficulties with German police authorities.
3. While stationed in Germany, you are subject to, and must respect and obey, the laws of the Federal Republic of Germany, as well as the laws of the United States.
4. In addition to your being subject to the jurisdiction of US military authorities, you may be arrested by the German police authorities and may be tried by the criminal courts of Germany for violations of German law.
5. Here are some DO's and DON'Ts if you are arrested by German police.
 - a. DON'T resist arrest or refuse to obey instructions.
 - b. DO furnish German police immediately with your name, rank and organization and show them your identification card or passport.
 - c. DO request that your Commanding Officer and the nearest US Military Police (M.P., A.P., or S.P.) be immediately notified of your apprehension. The reverse of this card contains a request in German that this notification be accomplished.
 - d. DO request the assistance of a qualified interpreter. Remember that any statement you make may be used against you.
 - e. DON'T leave the scene of an accident in which you become involved until authorized by the police.







Kennedy Says U.S. 'Will Risk Its Cities' to Defend Europe

FRANKFURT (AP) — President Kennedy, in a blunt rebuttal to French President Charles de Gaulle's concept of an independent Europe, said Tuesday those who would split allies "give aid and comfort" to enemies of the West.

"The United States," Mr. Kennedy promised, "will risk its cities to defend yours because we need your freedom to protect ours . . . Those who would doubt our pledge or deny this indivisibility — those who would separate Europe from America or split one ally from another — would only give aid and comfort to the men who make themselves our adversaries and welcome any Western disarray."

Million Yell 'Ken-ne-dee' In Berlin

BERLIN (S&S) — President Kennedy flew behind the Iron Curtain Wednesday to express his admiration for the people of West Berlin who live surrounded by an ocean of communism.

"I do not come to reassure this city," he said at an arrival ceremony. "It reassures us."

"This city is 3,500 miles from the United States, but we feel it to be part of us."

In a whirlwind day, President Kennedy received the greatest reception of his life as he toured West Berlin, gave three speeches and strode to the Berlin wall and looked into East Germany.

A crowd estimated at 1 million West Berliners—half the population of the divided city—lined his route cheering and waving and chanting "Ken-ne-dee . . . Ken-ne-dee . . ."

Mr. Kennedy was accompanied on his flight to West Berlin by Gen. Lucius D. Clay (ret.) former U.S. commandant in Berlin, who, the President said, had been "identified with Berlin during good times and bad."

Members of the White House staff said the President's flight to West Berlin through the central air corridor from Wiesbaden was

BERLIN (AP) — President Kennedy, in his key Berlin address, said Wednesday that the goal of liberty may well be obtainable in a reconstituted "larger Europe" on both sides of the Iron Curtain.
