# Kennedy Says U.S. ‘Will Risk 

 Its Cities' to Defend EuropeFRANKFURT (AP) - President Kennedy, in a blunt rebuttal to French President Charles de Gaulle's concept of an independent Europe, said Tuesday those who would split allies "give aid and comfort" to enemies of the West.
"The United States," Mr. Kennedy promised, "will risk its cities to defend yours because we need your freedom to protect ours . . . Those who would doubt our pledge or deny this indivisibility - those who would separate Europe from America or split one ally from another - would only give aid and comfort to the men who make themselves our adversaries and welcome any Western disarray."
