## Kalb Honored at Recent Assembly

Nuernberg American High School set aside November 9 to commemorate and honor General Johann de Kalb, a German patriot who served in the American Revolutionary Forces and died in the Battle of Camden. A special assembly program was held in his honor at the Kalb Community Theater.

The assembly was opened by the school singing the National Anthem and saying the Pledge to the Flag. A special poem, "Ship of State," was read by student council president Bob Callahan. Principal George Stevens then introduced the special guests, which consisted of Herr and Frau George Kalb of Nuernberg, Herr Leonhard Kalb, Burgermeister of Huettendorf, and his wife, Colonel John Finn, and Major Joseph McCullough.

A special address to the school on Johann de Kalb was given by Herr Kalb, "The Kalb I Know," in which he pointed out that if it were not for men like his ancestor, Baron de Kalb, we would not have our school today. It was based on the quote, "I prize liberty and freedom more than life itself."

His speech was followed by an address, "An American High School Student Thanks Kalb," by Dick Davis. Mr. Stevens led a prayer of dedication to the men who gave their lives for freedom. Following this was a moment of silent prayer as Jack Barnes played Taps. The assembly came to a close with the school standing and singing "America."

Baron de Kalb was born in Hüttendorf, a village near Erlangen. Sent by the French to the colonies on a covert mission, he later volunteered in the American army, where he served under General Horatio Gates in the disastrous Battle of Camden. Gates fled from the field, but de Kalb, unhorsed and fighting fiercely, stood his ground though wounded 11 times. He later died a prisoner of the British.

Upon visiting de Kalb's grave several years later, George Washington is reported to have said: "So, there lies the brave de Kalb. The generous stranger, who came from a distant land to fight our battles and to water with his blood the tree of liberty. Would to God he had lived to share its fruits!"—Ed.]

Skip used an encyclopedia only once. That particular instance was to check on the spelling of the name "Aasen," a Norwegian lexicographer.


Completing the task in about three and one-half hours, Skip worked on the puzzle both in study hall and classes. Which classes he wouldn't say!

... The Bavarian children have no Santa Claus as the American child knows him. On December 5, known as St. Nicholas Day, between five and six in the evening, a half-wild, bearded man comes storming out of the woods. In his hand he has a bundle of sticks. He has one task and that is to whip all the bad children. If he sees any children on the streets, they are immediately punished. He storms up to the doors of the homes and demands to know if there are any bad children in that house. If there are, he shouts to be admitted and straight-away punishes the children.

Some children collect in groups and show their courage by defying the wild man. This causes the half savage man to bellow with rage, and his bundle of switches cuts through the air like a handful of rapiers.

His task is usually completed by eight o'clock and he whirls back to his forest home to await another year. This custom is extremely Bavarian.

Santa does not come on Christmas in Bavaria, but the Christ Child comes in the form of an angel which no one ever sees. He comes in through the window of any room which has a crib and a Christmas tree.

The children have left their shoes with a letter to the Christ Child indicating their desires, and the angel leaves their gifts and takes the letters with him. The letters had been placed in shoes which must have been clean and well polished, or the letter was disregarded.

By 8 p.m. the children return to the room and find their gifts.

The best movie of 1962, as picked by 37 percent of the students who were questioned, was "Birdman of Alcatraz."


Other movies receiving votes were "Rome Adventure," "That Touch of Mink," "Counterfeit Traitor," and "King of Kings."

## **Trichter** Wins First-Place Rating In Columbia Press Association Contest 2nd Year in a Row

"I think it's wonderful, an outstanding job!" These words were spoken by Principal George Stevens about the receiving of a first place award by the *Trichter* from the Columbia Scholastic Press Association, connected with Columbia University.



Mr. Stevens also said that special credit was due to Mrs. Elliott, the *Trichter* adviser, for the commendable job she has done in taking over the supervising of the newspaper.

The scoring is based on the following four items: content, writing and editing, make-up, and general considerations. The *Trichter* won the award with 859 points

out of a possible 1000. The best score was in general considerations of which the paper received 100 out of 100. The lowest was in writing and editing. In this category, there was a possible 400 while the *Trichter* was given 305. In make-up, 174 of 200 was given, and in content 280 of 300 was received.

George Benford's sports column, "George's Growl," was pointed out and praised by the CSPA.

The *Trichter* submitted six issues of the 1962-63 paper and three issues of the 1961-62 paper. Last year's Civil War Centennial feature was also praised by the judges.

The judging is not based on the content of last year's paper, but, rather, only on this year's editions. The three copies sent from the previous year are used merely to compare the paper with another of a different staff.

Along with the plaque given to the *Trichter* came a booklet explaining and showing the scoring and basic ideas of the Association. There is a space provided for comments and suggestions from the judges. Their main goal is to offer professional constructive criticism to all newspapers entered in the contest. The general comment from CSPA was "a good paper."

This is the second year that the NHS *Trichter* has won the first place award from CSPA [Last year's paper scored 944 points out of a possible 1000] and the third year it has entered the CSPA contest.

Diana Lewis, editor-in-chief, expressed her feelings in the following quote: "I am proud of my staff for all of the issue they have contributed to. It was a wonderful day when we received that award, even though several told me that we could not possibly win it."


### **EAGLES WIN REGIONAL TRACK MEET**

The NHS track team continued its winning ways and came out on top of the heap at the 1963 Southern Regionals. The final score was **NHS 41 1/2**, Heidelburg 37, Augsburg 29 1/2, Munich 24, Ludwigsburg 16, and Wuerzburg and Karlsruhe 3 points each.

In a run down of events, Nuernberg took four firsts. Chuck Robinson won the discus with a throw of 129 feet, 10 inches. Another first place came in with the 800 meter relay team in the form of Jack Barnes, William Netter, Bob Glasgow, and Julio Rivera with a time of 1:34.7 Another first was garnered by Rivera in the broad jump with a leap of 20 feet, 11 3/4 inches. Butch Flinn tied a school record in the high jump, clearing 5 feet, 10 inches. He beat the next best jump by three inches. The high jump was probably the most interesting event of the day.

Although Lee of Augsberg won the 200 meter dash, NHS took second, third, and fourth places. Glasgow took second, Barnes took third, and Rivera placed fourth.
