
People—that's why they're here. Changes are always occurring and they must keep abreast of each one.



Tomorrow Is a Brave New World

The Guidance Department is separate from the faculty and the administration. but it tries to complement the work of those two branches of the school. The counselors are interested in anything and everything the students want to talk about: they want to help the students in every way possible, whether it be with family, school, and social problems or information about and planning for college.

According to Dr. Workman, head of the Guidance Department, the counselors are like "lawyers for the students," and they have their "code of ethics, much like the codes of ethics for doctors and psychiatrists." That is, everything discussed between a counselor and a student will be kept secret; the counselor will not discuss his conversation with the student with anyone else.

A section of the Guidance Dept, that has undergone a great change is the Health Education Branch, headed by Mrs. Nikka Dunn. Mrs. Dunn is now the Health Educator of our school, not just a nurse. In her own words," I'm no longer a band aid pusher." She emphasizes the mental, and physical development and special problems of individual teenagers. The Health Educator is interested in teenagers: she lets them know someone cares and is trying to help them. She is also available as a resource person for the teachers.

The Guidance Department is a vital part of the school, as it tries to meet the needs of each individual student.

















History Has A Lot to Offer

The chief aim of the Social Studies Dept. is to impress upon students an understanding of the historical, social, and political implications of a nation and its culture— as they will be the future of the world.

There is so much that history has to offer, it is hard to fit it into 3 or 4 years. During the freshman year, World Regions is taught to inform students of where they live, and how others around them live. World History, taken in the sophomore year, is so broad that only milestones of history can be touched. In the junior year U.S. History (after 1865) and finally Government and Contemporary Problems teaches those leaving high school a little of what they will be facing.

The department has tried to awaken students so that they can leave high school with a spirit alive with an understanding of the world we live in. Tomorrow is up to us and the teachers have tried to guide and give us insight into our duties as adults.






Students Find Math Fun



Seventh and eighth grade science classes are introductory courses to high school science. During the Freshman year. I.P.S. is offered. This course may be called a "stepping stone" to physics. Biology presents one of the first real tests to science students. One needs to have knowledge, and at the same time be able to apply it. Biology includes everything from protozoa

to the dissection of frogs. Chemistry, a combination of science and math, is offered for the advanced student. It gives a deeper insight into chemical studies. For the student who wishes yet to further his knowledge of science, there is Physics. Making cameras out of tin cans is just one of the projects of Physics class.

The Business Dept. — Kathleen Irving, Naomi Melby, and Joan Dingmann— have been busy teaching students how to communicate in the busi-


ness world of today. In the advanced courses, such as Office Practice, students work with transcribing machines, duplicators and other office machines.





Home Environmental Living? Home Economics? The Home Economics Dept. has been moving toward a wider, busier, more informed department. With only two teachers, they have been able to offer courses ranging from Interior Decorating and clothing classes to Adult Living. 
Variety Formed In Fine Arts

Rather, the student is free to spend time with projects that prove to be worthwhile. In the Junior High section, exploratory Art classes for a 9-week period are offered.

Art I and II are for the high school student. These classes have required projects, but the time that individual students spend with each project may, and very often does, vary. Silk screen, paper mosaic, and pen and ink are part of the students' work. For the student who shows a sign of talent or greater interest in art, there is Advanced Art. The advanced student works on a contract basis, and can pursue his desired field with the instructor available for advice. The Art Department might be summed up by saying, "Using new ideas and old materials is the main job."

Student Council is a group of students elected by the student body to form a student government. Their main purpose is to bring the ideas of the students together. The officers are elected in the spring preceding their time of office.



Mr. Fred Fulkerson and Miss Jo Ann Johnson are the sponsors.


Yearbook's A Family Affair





Newspaper Reaches Student Body







The 1971 football season is one that will long be remembered here at Nűrnberg. Our varsity team was perhaps the greatest Eagle Squad ever. The season started off slowly, as the Eagles lost to Wiesbaden and Berlin-both non-division games. However the tide turned at Munich. Nurnberg easily overpowered the Mustangs 26-6. Our first home game was against the highly favored Bitburg Barons, who were riding an eleven game winning streak. With the season's growing momentum, we crushed the Barons 54-0. In the next two weeks, at Soldiers' Field, the Eagles beat Augsburg 28-8, but lost to Heidelberg. Traveling to Mannheim, we shut-out the Bisons 16-0. Then in an exciting and very close Homecoming game, the mighty Eagles conquered the Baumholder Bucs 26-22 to close out a victorious season.

The Eagle team was basically a new one. There were only three returning lettermen out of twenty-three players. Of these twenty-three, sixteen were Seniors: Bob Brown, returning letterman and co-captain, who played both offense and defense and was one of the most valuable Nurnberg gridders; Bernie Davis was one of the finest running backs in the Red Division. Scoring 10 touchdowns and two points-after, he led the team in points; Howard Williams, who played fullback on offense, was a standout as defensive end and safety. Davis, Williams and Brown were among the top 25 scorers in Europe. Mike Marler, who played defensive end, always turned in a good performance. Ron Burgess was the starting center. Ralph Garogalo did a fine job as pulling guard. Rick Posey and Dale Eaton worked up to starting positions at alternating ends. John MacIntosh joined the Eagle squad late in the season. He was a defensive standout and also center. Norman Forbes and Tom Lankster were utility men; they played any position and were on the specialty teams. Mike Kitchens helped to round off a good defense—he was No. 4 defensive man.

Many seniors were plagued with injuries. Clint Smith, the most promising returning player, was injured in the second game and could not play the rest of the season. Bobby Sledge was sidelined with an injury but returned as an offensive and defensive specialist. Norm Hawkins recovered from a knee-injury to play starting guard. Grant Jones worked back from an injury to get on the specialty team and do the on-side kicking. We thank you seniors, for your efforts!

The Juniors on the varsity team were: Wally Knight, returning as quarterback; Stan Hatcher, co-captain, who was a linebacker; and Micky Wardell who was number I in defensive stops.

The Sophomores were: Toro Garofalo, co-captain, who was a defensive starter; Vic Wallace and Fritz Garrison who were defensive starters; Cedric Radford who started as a running back in a few games; Don Behrman who was the blitzing linebacker; and Mitch Muchsam who served as back-up quarterback.





The Varsity 71-72 season opened as the Eagles journeyed to Kaiser-slautern, where they defeated the Raiders, 60-56 and 44-37 on December 10-11. For the next pair of games, January 7-8, the Green and White traveled to Munich to trounce the Munich Mustangs 80-58 and 76-49. Then came the long trip to Stuttgart on January 14-15, where the Stallions and the Eagles each won a game. Nurnberg took the first, 70-66, but Stuttgart returned the compliment the next day, 78-65.

The following weekend Bitburg paid the team a visit, and again the Eagles split with their opponents. Friday, January 21, the Barons caged the Eagles 51-45, but Nurnberg came back on Saturday to nip the Bitburg team 52-50. The Varsity split with Wiesbaden on January 28-29, when the Warriors came to the Darby Gym. Friday the Warriors clipped the Eagle net men 62-54, but Saturday it was a different story as the Eagles quashed Wiesbaden's hopes for a double victory by defeating them 49-48. It was a first-place season for the Varsity Cagers up to that point. The next three weeks, however, gave them a fourth-place standing, as the Green and White lost four in a row.

On February 4-5, Eagles met Eagles head-on, but the Frankfurt Eagles overpowered the Nurnberg Eagles 65-57 and 65-62. Two weeks later after a bye-weekend, the Mannheim Bisons charged, and they didn't stop charging until they had dealt the Eagle Roundballers a serious pair of defeats, 71-41 and 48-43.


At the end of the 1971-1972 season of regular play, Nurnberg came in fourth among Class A teams, with 7 wins and 7 losses.

During three days of competition at Rhein-Main Air Base's Pitts Memorial Gymnasium in Frankfurt, the Varsity Eagles finished sixth place out of eight Class A USDESEA basketball teams. On February 24, the Eagles were defeated for the third time during the year by Mannheim, 46-38. The next day, Nurnberg put Torrejon out of competition, 67-63. On Saturday, February 26, the Varsity Cagers met the Stuttgart Stallions in a struggle for fifth place in the tournament, but the to-and-fro battle ended with the Stuttgart on top of the heap, 69-68.

The high scorer for the Varsity Eagles during the regular season was co-captain Stan Hatcher, a junior, who played in all 14 games and amassed 175 points, with an average of 12.5 points per game. He was followed in that category by Wally Knight, another junior, with 161 points, and Howard Williams, a senior, with 133 points. Supporting these leading scorers were Rodney Blackman, Sam Buster, Bernie Davis, Larry Flowers, Bob Crosby, Bob Sledge, Dieter Bednarski, and Cedric Radford. These players combined their efforts during the season to give the Nurnberg Varsity a total of 798 points for 14 games, an average of 57 points per game.

Coach Tom Gussner had this to say about the team: "This year's Nurnberg Basketball team developed a wonderful never-say-die attitude. Although this young team usually fell behind due to mistakes, they always made a great effort to come back, and often did win in the final seconds. For this reason and for others, I am very proud to have coached them."




Cross-country is not a spectator sport. The runners trek through more than two-and-a-half miles of woods, trails and over small obstacles in a race against the clock and against each other. They must cope with dangers that are unknown in most other sports: getting lost on poorly marked courses, and stray dogs. Practice is demanding—each team member runs an average of five miles each day, to which are added sprints and hill climbs.

Numberg's cross-country team finished the 1971-1972 season with a record of one win, four losses, and one tie. The runners placed seventh out of eight teams at the Regional competition at Heidelberg on October 29. Junior Ken Tinsman held this year's course record with a time of 14:46. 





Totally, the grapplers place in six weight divisions, capturing two first place seats, three second place, and one fourth place.

The coaches for this year's Eagle wrestlers were all new to NHS wrestling. Mr. Emanuel Raab, head coach, worked chiefly with the administrative and organizational aspect of the team. Mr. Winston Carter worked with the boys on developing their pinning techniques, and army captain Ron Vaughn worked with the young Eagles grapplers on most of the conditioning, and their maneuvering techniques.
