

NURNBERG BOMB SCARES

After being through several bomb scares at Nurnberg High School, the procedures concerning them are found to be unbeievable.

ATTENDANCE POLICY--DO WE NEED IT?

The attendance policy--do we need it? Some students that attend Nuernberg High School are almost eighteen years old. These students will soon be considered adults by society, yet they still have to get their parents to write a note for them to be excused. If these same eighteen year old people were to break a law, they would not have the opportunity to turn to their parents. They would be immediately considered adults and suffer the consequences of their acts.

In school, little emphasis is placed on student maturity and responsibility. Few students are capable of working on their own and making decisions for themselves. Teachers therefore follow through on this student incapability and create classroom atmospheres that are extremely structured. To rely on a cliche, this is indeed a "vicious cycle." The students show no responsibility, and the teachers give none. This is not to say that there are no exceptions. A handful of teachers let the students handle themselves, and some students do have the ability to judge for themselves the values of school. However, I feel that if more responsibility were carried by the students, the students would be the ones to benefit.

Concerning attendance policy, there is no better place to start producing more responsible students. What a sad state education is in if someone who is three months away from being on his or her own cannot make his or her own decisions! One way or another, a senior who is in the last semester of high school education is facing a future without the comforts of a parent or teacher making decisions for him or her.

To the student, I put this question: Don't you feel that you are the best judge of whether or not attending school regularly is important for your future? Whether you are going to college, getting a job, or getting married, you will be your own boss.

What better place than school to LEARN to control responsibility? What are the objections to having a second-semester senior write his or her own excuse for absences? I feel that, on the whole, the school system and society will benefit from the more mature student that will come from a more practical system.



In December 1979 the Fuerth High School invited us to an Experience Trip. We volunteered spontaneously. On the morning of the 7th of January 1980 we got on a green army bus. After hours of riding on a bouncing bus we finally arrived at the Hinterbrand Lodge in Berchtesgaden. After being told the rules of the house, we each moved into a room with three Americans. We just had to try out the beds right away. In the evening the first meeting took place. We were all divided into groups of four and were told which of the kitchen chores were our duty. We were supposed to be in our beds asleep by 10:30. Of course everyone stayed awake talking later thatn that.

After breakfast we went hiking, with backpack and food. This hike was kind of hard, because, for example, we had to climb a three meter high wall without any help. In the afternoon we got lost in the woods. This was a way of learning how to use a compass. After this we had another hike. On this hike we saw the Koenigsee, the Watzmann and the Jenner. Ben, one of the American teachers, tried to prepare us for the next day.

Wednesday morning we went jogging through the woods again and rolled in the snow. After we got our supplies the hardest part of the trip began. With 15 pounds on our backs and the long skis we walked up and down the hills. From the close-by Jenner we could hear the loudspeakers blaring the results of the World-Cup-Skiing meets then taking place. After a lunch consisting of sandwiches and water, we put the skis back on. It was now a question, after the long hike, to master a difficult ski course. After this we got on our back packs, armed ourselves with shovels and made for our campsite. Now you could prove your talents in building an igloo, and everything had to move fast as the night was approaching. From the loose snow a snow house had to be built. In the course of this work all remaining inhibitions were cast off, and everyone helped everyone, regardless of nationality.




