

# School fulfills mural responsibility

FUERTH, Germany — For 15 years folks driving past Nuernberg American High School at Christmas have seen murals in the school windows.

For just as many years, they have craned their necks to get a better look while saying, "Isn't that nice? I wonder who did it."

The answer this year: Joseph Serino and Sandra Ingemansen.

Serino is the high school art teacher. Each September he assigns his students to create a design for the 36 panels of the three-story window in the facade of the school's main building.

Serino and school administrators pick the best of more than 100 ideas. This year's proposal came from 16-year-old National Honor Society member Sandra Ingemansen.

Her mural shows a huge angel with long sweeping multi-colored robes on the right side of the picture. On the left, a girl in a pretty blue dress is giving her favorite teddy bear to an African girl in tattered rags.

"I started with three ideas," Ingemansen said. "Christ giving a gift to the girl, the little girl giving the bear away —without the angel, and just the large angel. I decided to combine them."

Serino said each year's idea must be appropriate to the season, artistically appealing and practical to execute. Once the decision is made, students from all of his classes work on individual panels.

"Some take two days," he said. "More complicated ones take two weeks."

The material is a translucent gel-like paper that Serino buys in German stores. The completed picture goes up two days before Thanksgiving and comes down Jan. 6.

Serino said the range of ideas is wide open, although he suggests Christmas themes, such as peace on Earth, thankfulness or brotherhood.

"Sandra's idea is the lesson of sacrifice," he said.
