
DRAWDOWN HITS NUERNBERG SCHOOLS

Three years ago the Nuernberg military community was a bustling metropolis of a sort. School enrollment was at its peak. The new, long awaited elementary school at Montieth Barracks opened its doors in August 1990. Nuernberg Middle School was a welcome addition to the school complex. Kalb elementary, Erlangen elementary, and Nuernberg High Schools continued to thrive.

Then came the fall of the wall and the opening of the borders between the east and the west. With this new found freedom came the end of the "Cold War" and "DRAWDOWN." The U.S. started to pull troops out of Europe. Germany was hit hard and Nuernberg in particular.

In June 1993 Nuernberg ES at Montieth closed its doors and Nuernberg Middle School became a part of the high school. Erlangen ES is slated to close at end of SY 93-94 and Kalb ES shortly there after.



STUDENTS EXPERIENCE AN EXCHANGE OF CULTURE

Three years ago Nuernberg High School started an exchange program with the Oberschule Baerenstein in Saxony, former East Germany. The "wall" came tumbling down and eastern Europe opened up to us here in the west. We have been witnesses to the biggest, most peaceful revolution in history.

For three years Nuernberg students have been traveling to the tiny town of Barenstein, on the border of Czechoslovakia (now Slovakia). What a

learning experience! The I Baerenstein community is economically very depressed (60% unemployment), where as we are a middle class community. Two worlds, attitudes, life styles, value systems, and yet this is a great lesson for our young people-all of us human beings who laugh and cry for the same reasons.

Though rebuilding activity is in full swing in eastern Germany, being there is still a unique experience, like walking through an old photo album of faded colors and outlines, mostly black and white. The people are not yet corrupt, they are genuine and generous.

Our program for this year looks like this, November 6-13, fifteen to twenty pupils from Barenstein will be with us at NMHS. February 19-26, we will be in Baerenstein.

Objectives of this cultural exchange are:

*To experience everyday life in a German community.

*The opportunity to meet with and develp meaningful relationships with individuals from a differnt culture.

*To awaken interest in the German language.

*To become aquainted with Germany, its culture, food, history, schools, institutions.

Students are expected to participate fully in the program and make every effort to fit in with the host family and their activities. Each pupil is expected to keep a diary or journal about his/her experiences. impressions, understandings, and interpretations.

Ms. Norma Kaes is the coordinator of this very worth while program.





conference your group had to write a report on the conference. Again 11 o'clock lights out and the night stalker continued.







Chilled Shrimp Pasta Salad

- 1 cup lowfat plain yogart
- 2 tablespoons salt substitute seasoning
- 2 tablespoons brown spicy mustard 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoons pepper
- 3 ribs celery chopped
- 3 large tomatoes diced
- 1 bunch green onions chopped
- 1 pound cooked shrimp

1 pound macaroni, cooked without salt or fat

Combine yogurt, seasoning, mustard, salt and pepper in chilled large bowl. Mix well. Add celery, tomatoes and green onions. Mix well. Add shrimp amd macaroni. Mix well. Refrigerate about 2 hours before serving. Tablespoon plus 2 teaspoons sugar
teaspoon celery seed
4 teaspoon dry mustard
cups shredded cabbage
medium red apple, chopped
cup finely chopped green bell
pepper

2 Tablespoons finely chopped onion

Combine sour cream, Crisco Oil, vinegar, sugar, celery seed, salt and dry mustard in small bowl. Combine cabbage, apple, green pepper and onion in large bowl. Pour creamy mixture over vegetables. Toss to mix. Cover and refrigerate until ready to serve. Toss again just before serving.

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SPRING HAS SPRUNG AND WITH IT COMES OSTERN

All seasons play an important part in the lives of the Germans, the awakening of nature after the sterility of winter, the water released from the ice, the traditions of the Easter rabbit and Easter eggs all bring a special joy of renewal and hope in the spring. Many spring and Easter customs have evolved over the years and are reflected during the holiday season. The name OSTERN (Easter) points to a sun cult. This may indicate a festival in honor of the spring goddess "Ostara" or it may refer to the spring sun rising with increasing warmth in the Ostern (east). The goddess Ostara was known to the Anglo-Saxons as Eastre or Easter. The German Easter Festival, celebrated as a reawakening of nature, is clearly indicated in the name. Easter, the Resurrection of Jesus Christ on the third day after the crucifixion, is the oldest Christian feast introduced in the second century. Palm Sunday, "Grundonnerstag" and Good Friday, "Karfreitag" are important and sacred holy days preceding Easter.

One of the most popular traditions during the week prior to Easter is the coloring and hand decorating of Easter eggs. Children and adults enjoy creating original designs on hard cooked eggs or on the more delicate shell of the blown-out egg. These eggs are often given as gifts to friends and used to decorate an Easter tree. Fresh green forsythia or pussy willow branches are cut and brought into the house as a symbol of spring and the renewal of life. Colored eggs or hand painted wooden eggs hang from the branches as an attractive Easter greeting.

There is little activity on "Karfreitag", Good Friday. It is a quiet time and in many homes there is no television all day but rather sacred music is heard.

Easter Sunday brings the message of the risen Lord and with it a rebirth and renewal. The traditional "Osterpaziergang", Easter stroll is the highlight of the day and affords one the opportunity to be outside with nature. Many local Germans enjoy a walk after dinner and being out in nature. This custom gives children the opportunity to look for chocolate eggs on the paths. The Easter bunny has already hidden dyed and decorated eggs in the garden or in the house. At the crack of dawn, children run about to look for hidden eggs and to fill their baskets "Eierlesen".

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In other sections of Germany various customs and celebrations occur. Maidens or young unmarried girls in northern Germany dip up "Easter water" from the river as the sun comes up, maintaining complete silence as they do so. This water is to make them beautiful, but the magic is lost if a word is spoken. There are many traditions observed during the Easter season. One of these is the dramatic representation of the Passion of Jesus, from which the internationally famous Oberammergau Passion Play developed.

Special dishes belong to Easter dinner observances in many places. A speciality in some homes is the "Osterlamm", (Easter lamb) cake. It is baked in a lamb cake form and decorated with a fluffy white frosting and coconut simulating wool. The resurrection banner of a purple cross on a white background adorns the top of the cake. Upon returning from the late afternoon walk, the hostess may serve this cake and other special tarts with coffee to her hungry family and friends.

The joyous message of OSTERN is upon us.
