Martin Luther King Jr.

Martin Luther King Jr. was a Baptist minister who led the first civil rights movement in the United States history.

According to **Encyclopedia Britannica** Martin Luther King was born in Atlanta, Georgia on January 15, 1929. King came from a strict Southern Baptist family. His father and maternal grandfather were Baptist ministers. At the age of 15, King entered Morehouse College under a program for gifted students. After graduating in 1948 King entered the Crozer Theological Seminary in Chester, Penn. to become a minister. He was elected student body president and graduated with the highest grade point average in his class. From Crozer he went to Boston University to study the relationship of man to God. It was here in Boston that King met his future wife, Coretta Scott. They were married in 1953 and had four children. King became involved in his first civil rights protest in Montgomery, Alabama when he was fighting racial segregation on public buses. Black activists chose King as their leader and formed the Montgomery Improvement Association. In his first speech as the Association's President, King advocated non-violence, but also stated that blacks were no longer going to be considered as second class citizens. Instead the blacks would fight for equal rights the non-violent way. After this speech King's home was bombed and his family's life was threatened. Yet, he refused to give in; one year and a few weeks later, the blacks of Montgomery achieved their goal of non-segregation on the city buses.

Soon King recognized the need for nationwide civil rights and he formed the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), which gave him a national platform in which to voice his opinions. King lectured problems of black segre-

gation with many world leaders and politicians.

From 1960 to 1965 King's influence was at its peak. His tactics of non-violence aroused the nation and won support of many blacks and liberal whites in all parts of the country.

In 1963, King started a national campaign to end segregation at lunch counters. He drew nation wide attention when police used firehoses and dogs to break up a sit-in at a local diner. Martin and 33 of his followers were arrested and put in jail. In 1971, eight years later blacks were finally able to sit in a diner without being discriminated against.

On August 28, 1963 an assembly of over 20,000 people gathered at the Lincoln Memorial to demand equal rights for all citizens under the law. It was at this assembly that King uttered his famous words, "I have a dream..." which started a worldwide wave for civil rights. As the rising tide of civil rights increased it had a strong affect on the national opinion, resulting in the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. It authorized the federal government to enforce non-segregation laws. Nineteen sixty-four ended on a high note for King when he won the Nobel Peace Prize at Oslo in December for his stand on non-violent racial equality.

In March 1965 there was a demonstration at Selma, Alabama which was aimed at the need for a federal voting rights law. King organized a march from Selma to the state capitol, but before they could reach their destination, they were turned back by the state troopers with night sticks and tear gas. This made King even more determined to lead a second march despite warnings from government officials to cancel it. One thousand five hundred people participated in this march across the Pettus Bridge in Selma until they were blocked by a wall of state troopers. Instead, of it being the bloody confrontation that it could've been King led his group in prayers and then unexpectedly turned back. The country became inflamed with the news of the march; resulting in the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

In the next few years before his death King started a drive against segregation in housing. After almost five months of sit-ins, rallies, and marches a Summit

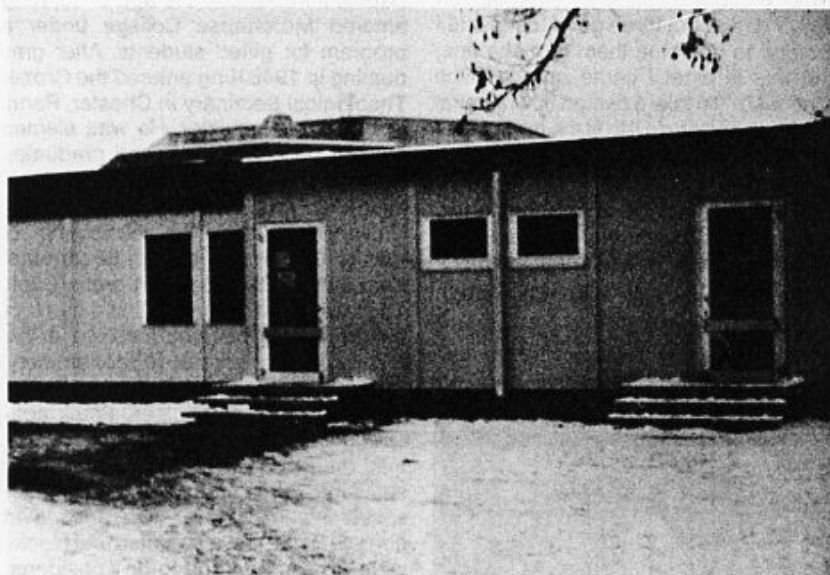
Carpets

Agreement was signed between the city and a group of blacks, liberals, and labor unions calling for an end to housing segregation.

Between the years of 1966 to 1967 King organized and spoke at many rallies about desegregation of blacks and whites.

In 1968 King had planned a Poor People's March to Washington, but the plans were changed and instead he went to support a strike by city sanitation workers in Memphis, Tenn. On April 4, 1968 King was assassinated while standing on the balcony of his hotel room. The white assassin, James Earl Ray, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 99 years in prison. One of King's followers said after his death, "The King is dead, but his dreams will live on forever."

College Information

From now until June, the Trichter will feature college information for high school students who are undecided about their future.

This month's two college spotlights are Colorado College and Georgia State University. Colorado College offers bachelors degrees in business, education, English, health, science, math, language, and philosophy. All bachelors degrees programs can lead to masters degrees. Georgia State University offers bachelors degrees in business, education, English, fine and performing arts, languages, math, philosophy, and social sciences. Masters and doctoral degrees are also offered in these subjects.

According to **Barrons Profiles of American Colleges** Colorado College is a highly competitive college. Out of the 2,100 students who applied only 1,300 were accepted. Yearly tuition is \$7,000 and room and board is \$2,400. All students are required to take the ACT* and SAT*.

About a third of the students belong to one of 5 fraternities and 4 sororities on campus. The more than 60 student or-

per, an orchestra, religious groups, drama, debate, choir, and community volunteer groups.

The college competes on an intercollegiate level in 14 sports for men and 11 for women. There are 22 intramural sports for men and women.

Students must take courses in their chosen major, a thematic minor, alternate perspectives, and natural sciences.

Six honors societies including Phi Beta Kappa are represented on campus. A selected Student Program is available.

The college offers other services such as psychological counseling, financial aid, and health care. For more information write to:

According to **Barrons Profile of American Colleges** Georgia State University is a competitive college. Two thousand four hundred and three students applied last year but only 1,702 were accepted. On your SAT you must have a minimum verbal score of 460 and a minimum math score of 492. Tuition is \$1050 a year for Georgia State residents and \$3390 for non-residents.

There are over 100 student organizations including professional, service, honor, and social groups. There are eight sororities and 12 fraternities. Social events include Homecoming, Mardi Gras, Spring Festival, and Greek Week.

The University offers eight intercollegiate sports for men and six for women. There are also 14 intramural sports for men and 11 for women.

It is required that students take courses in English, literature, math, social science, and laboratory science. You must also take courses in your intended major.

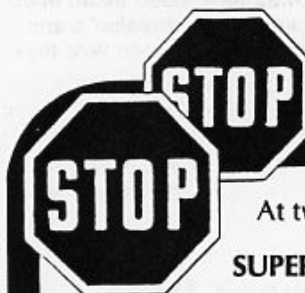
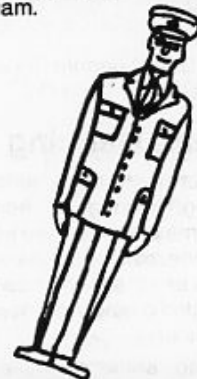
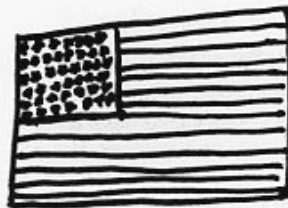
