# Excerpts from the Student Handbook 

## I.

## ORGANIZATION OF THE SCHOOL

## ACCREDITED STANDING

USAREUR high schools are accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools in the United States. This accreditation means that a recommended graduate of any of the nineteen high schools will be considered for admission to almost all institutions with full credit given for his high school work. In order for a student to be recommended from his high school, he must maintain high standards of scholarship throughout his years of high school work and be in the upper two-thirds of his class.

## APPEARANCE

Proper appearance not only makes a good impression upon visitors to high schools and citizens of the host countries in which the schools are located, but has also been shown to have a high relationship to achievement and success.

Students in USAREUR high schools must come to school clean, and in clean, well-tailored clothes.
Boys in upper classes are encouraged to wear jackets and ties during the regular school day for academic classes. Girls must wear dresses or skirts and blouses.

## CONDUCT

The conduct of high schools students shall indicate a sincere interest in their school work, a genuine concern for the welfare of the public property they use, and respect, courtesy, and friendliness for both their teachers and fellow students.

## PUPILS' MARKS

A report of each student's marks will be given to parents at the end of nine weeks' marking period. A report will be sent at the end of the fourth week of each marking period if marks are unsatisfactory.

The computation of grades is determined as follows:

## HOMEWORK

Homework is an integral part of school work and must be carefully prepared. The amount of homework done will help determine the academic standing the student will maintain. A daily home preparatory period of at least thirty minutes for each subject is considered necessary. However, the amount of homework you will need to do will depend upon the difficulty of the academic program, participation in extra-curricular activities, and capabilities.

## EXAMINATIONS

A final comprehensive examination constructed by the teacher and covering the work of the entire semester for each high school subject for which there is credit of one-half unit for a semester or one unit for a year. Such examinations normally count about one-third of the final mark of the course.

## CAFETERIA

Cafeterias are operated in schools where most of the students live too far from the school to eat lunch at home. The food served in the school cafeteria is nourishing, healthful, and moderately priced.

## SMOKING

Students will not be permitted to smoke in the school building or its immediate vicinity. Smoking in the residence halls will be allowed in specified places only, and with the written permission of the parent.

## PROGRAM OF STUDIES

## GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

To be graduated, students must have successfully completed the following:
Graduates in June 1960: $\quad 171 / 2$ units
Graduates in June $1961 \quad 18$ 1/4 units
Graduates in June $1962 \quad 19$ 1/2 units
The graduation units must include:

1. English-four units
2. One major-three units from one additional subject-matter field.
3. Three minors of two units each from other subject-matter fields, including the required minors in both social studies and science unless one of these is used as the major.
4. At least one unit of mathematics
5. One and one-half units in physical education (including first aid and safety), unless excused for medical reasons; one-half unit in guidance courses.
6. One-fourth unit in personal typing or one unit for Typing I.

Students taking a foreign language are urged to complete three units of the elected language. A minor in a foreign language requires two units of the same language. Graduation credit may be received for one year of a language, but most colleges do not recognize less than two years as meeting language entrance requirements.
