German teens learning to love basketball

By DAN SYNOVEC Nürnberg bureau chief NÜRNBERG (S&S) – "Interest in bas-ketball is growing among German youths," said Nürnberg American High School prep basketball coach Tom Gussn-er.

Gussner, whose cagers posted a 7-5 record in USDESEA last season, is spendrecord in USDESEA last season, is spend-ing one night a week teaching German youths the fundamentals of basketball. The youths, who are 17 and 18 years old, play in a city basketball league here. "They have a little trouble with some of the drills I'm trying to teach them," Gussner said during a workout in the Sie-mens Co. gym in south Nürnberg. "But they are soing to improve and then their

they are going to improve and then their German coaches will have to demand more out of them."

Georg Sturm, one of the few German coaches in the city, said Gussner is a "big

help." "There are just too few coaches." Sturm said. "I think Gussner will help us a lot." Sturm said that Germans have been learning American basketball from Americans for nearly 20 years.

"The interest in basketball in Germany is growing. But Germans play more bas-ketball in Munich, Barnberg, Augsbarg and Würzburg then we play in Nürnberg," Sturm added.

Gussner said the German youths need to practice more then the one hour a week they practice now. Practice sessions begin with a shake of the hand and a nod hello. The Germans have trouble dribbling the

ball without looking at it. Palming the ball is a problem and so is their tendency to travel. But, what they lack in finesse and experience they make up in enthusiasm. Gussner issues his instructions in halting German which is sometimes greeted with grins, not to men-tion a few blank looks.

Sturm said the German youths are pleased to have Gussner come out to coach them. It seems that the American prep coach has a German friend who recruited "I would like Herr Gussner to remain with us as our trainer," the German teen said

said. Gussner said he only has been stressing the basics of the game, and the German youths are not ready to take on an Ameri-can high school team. However, on Monday evenings some of the American high school students who are interested in basketball get together in the school gym and scrimmage a German men's team. Gussner said the young Yanks don't do too badly against the older German club. "We win some and lose some," he ad-mitted. "And I think the experience of helping coach the German youths and then getting together to scrimmage the German



Coach Gussner's Summary of the 1975-76 Varsity Basketball Season

Conference Record: 7 Wins-5 Losses

Returning Lettermen From '74-'75: Jay DeLaune, Billy Price, Mike Hudacek Blue Division Tournament: Sixth Place

A trip to Frankfurt to open conference play resulted in two close losses, but on the bright side, Senior Tony Newton and Junior O'Dillard Johnson combined for 75 points.

As usual, Nurnberg entered tournaments during Christmas Vacation and played very well. At Wurzburg, the Eagles placed third in a grueling double elimination tournament. After falling to the home town Wolves by two points in the semi final game, then defeating Hanau 49-47. Nurnberg finished fourth at the Heidelberg tourney. Newton was selected to both All Tournament Teams, and Johnson was also honored in Heidelberg. After splitting a weekend series in Stuttgart, NHS found themselves with a 1-3 record, but not to be denied, the Eagles won 6 of their next eight games to finish strong. The Green and White surprised the first place Heidelberg Lions on Friday by virtue of a come from behind 62-60 win. The Lions held on to a slim one point lead with 50 seconds remaining on the clock, but Herb Davis who had 16 points and 17 rebounds scored on a rebound shot, then stole the inbound pass, and passed to Newton who made the lay up for his 22nd point. Jay Delaune added 14 counters.

Davis continued his strong inside play in a 55-50 win against Kaiserslautern with 17 points and 16 rebounds Friday night. Johnson added 15 for the Eagles playing without Coach Gussner, who was at the 130th general hospital with his wife, Maria, for the birth of their daughter, Jamie. Gussner was on the phone with Jeff "Oscar" Smith at Darby Gym for the play by play, while J.V. Coach, Milton Jackson, handled the coaching duties. On Saturday, Newton and Johnson combined for 47 points in a 67-44 win over the Red Raiders.

In Mannheim, Nurnberg was in the familiar position of being behind late in the game. With just seconds remaining on the clock and leading 62-61, the Bison's Lopez went to the free throw line for the opportunity to win the game. As the shot was missed, Davis pulled down his 17th rebound, passed the ball to Johnson at half court. Johnson hit a streaking Newton who made a lay up for his 28th point. Delaune and Johnson each contributed 10 in the win. The next day, the Eagles outhustled Mannhein in a 24 point win.

Despite Newton's 20 points on Friday night, Weisbaden prevailed 70-59, but Saturday was another story. The Warriors maintained a 54-53 lead with 6 seconds remaining in the game, but Newton was fouled while shooting. He calmly stepped to the line, and made both attempts knocking Weisbaden out of second place in the Blue Division. Weisbaden did, however, win the season ending tournament. Junior Walter Redd had also been instrumental in the success of the team with pressure defense, strong rebounding, and timely shots. Sophomore Billy Price averaged 10 rebounds per game. Tony Newton was named to the Blue Division All Conference Team on the strength of his 16.1 ppg and 81 rebounds in 12 games. In addition, he was first team All-Europe selection.
